New in September!

As we move into the fall season, we are going to see a lot of new things in the area. Squirrels will be getting ready for winter, birds will be in abundance, the leaves will change colour and fall to the ground, and the weather will get cooler.

This is a great time for nature experiences such as collecting and drying leaves, observing animals, observing changes in the environment, and learning about hibernation. (It's never too early to start learning about the environment around us!)

Things we will be working on:

2.1 & 3.2 Expressing emotions, needs, and making verbal requests to educators and peers

2.5 Taking responsibility when dressing (jackets and hats); making choices without being prompted

3.1 Listening to longer and more complicated stories

4.4 Helping to sort and tidy toys by putting them in the correct baskets

5.1 Continuing to master walking up and down stairs

Preschool ahead...

It may a ways away, but Preschool is right around the corner for your little one. While our daily schedule and routines are similar, there are some changes to be aware of:

In the classrooms

- There are 2 educators and 16 children in each Preschool room.
- Children travel in small groups to and from the playground (and washroom).

Developmentally

- Children may begin to shorten their nap. This is a direct result of increased activity during outdoor play and may result in a different sleep schedule overnight. Sleep schedules may require adjusting.
- Stay tuned for increased language and memory capacity, increased emotional regulation, and the need to be independent.

Your child is developing so quickly! Supporting them through these changes and getting them prepared for Preschool early positively influences them during this new upcoming transition.
